

Coxsackie Diner

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It all started with a letter of inquiry from Virginia E. Pisano of Sound Beach, a letter which had for its subject the "MISS COXSACK-IE" DINER. The correspondent, now a widow, was making a scrapbook of memories for her children and to be included was a menu from "Miss Coxsackie."

Somewhat uncertain of the time of the first visit, Mrs. Pisano did know she and her husband, a for-

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mer called-up Korean War soldier, had stopped at Coxsackie on a trip in October, 1990, but could not find the diner and as she writes, "Everyone I asked looked at me as if I had two heads."

Inquiries by this columnist among local historians finally led to Frances Adams. She recollected the diner on Route 9W and the names of the proprietors, but was uncertain as to the exact location near the Institution.

Always a source of local information, printer Bill Bergman was also most helpful. By sheer coincidence, during the past week or two, he had been studying an old "Miss Coxsackie" menu. A few days later he telephoned me to stop in the print shop; he had also found a snapshot of "Miss Coxsackie".

The location is now definite, being on the west side of Route 9W; the present Bronck Museum Shop, then an unused outbuilding, shows in the right distance. A central entrance door diner, "Miss" appears across the left front and "Coxsackie" on the right.

The scanning of the menu is an experience and reminds one how much the buying power of the dollar has evaporated with inflation. The full course Sunday dinner, with a choice of chicken, turkey or steak was priced as 65 cents, 75 cents and \$1. The regular grilled Beef Tenderloin accompanied by French fries, lettuce salad, hot rolls and

butter set the customer back 60 cents.

With the exception of these aforementioned items, nothing on the large menu was over 50 cents. Sandwiches ranged in price from 15 cents to a hot turkey at 40 cents.

The menu advertised "24-hour service", seven days the week. It also contained a brief historical sketch of Coxsackie.

Available information indicates the war years with its shortage of gasoline made the diner unprofitable. Bill Bergman believes it was removed to Schenectady and operated as a restaurant in a location across the roadway from the General Electric Employment Office.

That owners, Webb and Van Schaack, approved customers taking the menus is indicated by the printed statement: "A Souvenir To Remember Us By". And that is just what the Pisanos did. We hope she has space in her scrapbook for this page of the *Greene County News*.

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
